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COMMUNITY GARDEN PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENT

WHEREAS the purpose is to grant permission for the use of municipally owned lands located at Ravine Park, as outlined on the plan in attached Schedule "A" for the purpose of a community garden, subject to the Terms and Conditions of this Agreement contained herein and attached hereto all of which form part of this Agreement;

AND WHEREAS the Town shares the objectives of providing a suitable location for a community garden;

TERMS AND CONDITIONS:

- The terms of this Agreement shall be in effect from May 1st, 2017 to April 30th, 2022 1) with the option to renew the Agreement if the community garden is managed and maintained to the satisfaction of the Town.
- The License must carry a Public Liability Insurance of \$2 million that explicitly 2) indemnifies, defends and holds harmless the Town from and against any damage or injury to any person or any real property.
- Vehicle access to the community garden is subject to Town approval. Automobile 3) Insurance of \$2 million that explicitly indemnifies, defends and holds harmless the Town from and against any real property is required if vehicles are required to access garden.
- It is understood that the Town of Lake Cowichan or its duly appointed representative 4) shall maintain the right to rescind the use of the community garden and terms of this Agreement if there is reason to believe there is a non-compliance with this Agreement and/or Town By-Laws and/or provincial regulations, or if the property is required for other emergency purposes.
- The limits of the community garden(s) shall be within the area described and fenced in 5) the plan in Schedule "A". Any enhancement of the community garden shall require a written request and approval from the Town and adhere to the Community Garden Policy.
- Prior to the development and/or enhancement of the community garden(s), the 6) Applicant:
 - a) Shall ensure that the terms and conditions of this Agreement and the limits of the approved community garden site plan are brought to the attention of all community garden members.
 - b) Shall notify and seek approval from the Town for the operation of any heavy equipment

forward as expeditiously as possible so as to cause minimum nuisance to neighbours and take reasonable precaution to ensure the safety of the public.

- 8) The Licensee understands that public access to the community garden(s) for enjoyment is permitted and facilitated.
- 9) Any chemical use in the community garden(s) as defined in the Community Garden Policy shall be prohibited.
- **10)** Produce grown in allotment plots within the community garden will be for the personal use and consumption of the individuals involved in the community garden.
- **11)** The Licensee:
 - a) Shall develop and maintain the community garden at no cost to the Town except for the initial start-up costs;
 - **b)** Indemnifies, defend and hold harmless the Town from and against any damage or injury to any person or any real property;
 - **c)** Shall maintain the community garden including collection and removal of litter and debris;
 - **d)** Shall elect a Garden Coordinator or Executive in a valid and open process that will be responsible for management of the community garden;
 - e) Shall be responsible for developing and administering their own Community Garden Member Agreement, which must be signed by all individuals occupying the land for the purpose of a community garden. The Community Garden Member Agreement shall include and adhere to the terms and conditions in the Community Garden Policy. A copy of the Community Garden Member Agreement shall be provided to the Community Garden Coordinator;
 - f) Shall provide for a valid and open process in the allotment of the garden spaces in accordance to the terms and conditions set out in the Community Garden Policy. Residents of the Town of Lake Cowichan shall be given priority for the opportunity to participate in the community garden program; and
 - g) Shall provide current contact information for the Garden Coordinator or Executive as well as proof of required insurance as outlined above to be kept on file with the Town.
- **12)** Community garden(s) proposed near storm water management ponds, drainage swales and floodplains shall be subject to the following conditions:
 - a) No fill material of any kind shall be placed within 6m from the top of the flood risk area;
 - **b)** Only native species shall be planted in floodplains that are identified to be in an Environmental Protection Area; and
 - c) Pet policy of the Community Garden Club that is acceptable to the Town must be filed.

As Managers of the Cowichan Lake Outdoor Education and Conference Centre and Lakeview Public ax 250 749 6525 Park and Campground, the views that we expressed at the time are further solidified given the respective concerns raised by the Cowichan Lake and River Stewardship Society and one of our clients, The Inner Quest Foundation.

Letters written by both of these groups address the real concerns that we have raised and we sincerely believe that should the proposed logging take place, the Cowichan Lake Outdoor Education and Conference will be negatively impacted.

The loss of revenue seems unavoidable, therefore reducing employment and socio-economic opportunities. Logging in an area so close to the lake seems contrary to what one would expect when safe water and protecting the environment are concerns of every citizen.

We are not objecting to logging; we fully understand that the professional Foresters involved that are determining the area to be logged will ensure best practices. However, in this case, it would be best to not log this forest and secure another location with much lower impact to provide the Lake Cowichan First Nation with the 4,000 cubic metres they have been promised.

Of further concern, is the long range vision for these properties post logging and pre-development. As repeatedly noted in reports from Biologist Ted Burns, Thurber Engineering and the Cowichan Lake and River Stewardship Society, the hydrology of this second growth area is very sensitive given the year round ground water run-off. Short term logging for "volume" could jeopardize future benefits for a valuable resource that could be an extension of the public park that has already been created and joins The Cowichan Lake Outdoor Education and Conference Centre and Lakeview Park.

This property was once recorded as a Class C Provincial Park by policy makers, and the lands were to be protected by a board to oversee the public uses for the benefit of the community. Now it seems that the land will be used as a short term cash opportunity and does not portray a community with a long term vision and true understanding of sensitive environmental areas.

Therefor we ask that the Province, and all groups involved with exploring the possibility of logging this area, reconsider, and seek other alternative land to fulfill promises made.

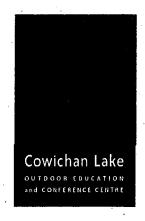

Dear Gentlemen,

I would like to bring to your attention a number of concerns that I have regarding Fax 250 749 6213 the possibility of logging the area as defined in the Notice of Public Hearing. I cleace island the impact of logging in this sensitive area will be negative lake cowichan. bc.ca for our communities in the Cowichan Lake Watershed.

In a number of environmental assessments that have been completed for this particular area beginning in 1998 and through to 2009, Mr. Ted Burns / Biologist and also a report titled The Ecological Habitat Review Lakeview Development indicate that the area located between Lakeview Campsite and the Cowichan Lake Outdoor Education Centre is rich with important and sensitive habitat for the health and integrity of a lakeside forest. This particular area is well known as a seepage and riparian forest and in reports Mr. Ted Burns has named it Crying Hills as it is wet twelve months a year. These reports are available upon your request.

In addition, the deforestation of this area may preclude economic opportunities for both the Cowichan Lake Band and the Town of Lake Cowichan. Specifically I am concerned that should this area be logged, the opportunity to build an extension to the existing campground with the First Nation and the Town of Lake Cowichan as partners would not be realistic, as it would no longer be an attractive area to encourage people to come to our community. I believe it is important to demonstrate responsible logging as we are a forest based community however when at all possible we should not be logging so close to the lake, when it has the potential to negatively impact our community while we attempt to balance tourism and forestry as economic generators.

Also, at a time when we are so concerned about water quality, it would be important to have expert advice on whether logging could affect the turbidity of

the lake when the drinking water intake for the Town is only hundreds of meters away from the proposed logging area.

The impact to Lakeview Park and The Cowichan Lake Outdoor Education Centre is obvious.

There are approximately seven seepage streams running into Lake Cowichan between Lakeview Park and The Cowichan Lake Outdoor Education Centre and one can only imagine the possible impact logging and road building would have on these streams. It should also be noted that there is a significant pond in the middle of the proposed area that holds water for nine months of the year and is wet all year round and contributes to sensitive and important habitats.

While I believe the funds generated for the Cowichan Lake First Nation is important and the Band should be compensated by the Crown by way of logging opportunities I would hope that another area of equal value away from the centre of our communities could be negotiated in a timely manner. Of course the other option that perhaps could be explored could be cash value from the Crown and preserve the lands between Lakeview Park and the Cowichan Lake Education Centre as parkland for our communities and or economic opportunities for the Band and the Municipality.

I would be pleased to elaborate on these thoughts and concerns and am available at your convenience.

I write to you on behalf of the Inner Quest Foundation of Victoria, BC. We have been hosting major international retreats at the Cowichan Lake Education Centre (CLEC) several times a year since 2001 and as such play a crucial role in the economic survival of the Education Centre and those employed there.

Our international clientele book retreats with us in large part due the unspoiled natural environment we can guarantee them at the CLEC. Their experience begins the moment they turn off South Shore Road and proceed down Lakeview to Cowichan Lake. They can find nothing comparable in their European and Australian homelands and return year after year knowing that the experience that awaits them is unlike any other in the world.

Logging this area will force us to completely re-evaluate future bookings at CLEC. Should the proposal go ahead, we will absolutely need to look elsewhere for a similar venue. The result will inevitably be lost revenue for the town of Cowichan Lake, and loss of livelihood for the employees and owners of the CLEC. We are therefore deeply concerned about plans to log between Lakeview Park and the Cowichan Lake Education Centre.

Our European guests in particular are extremely ecologically minded. They have noticed the changes to the shoreline and surrounding area, the overall increase in noise levels, and the obvious logging practices which have marred the landscape. They see, as we do a once pristine area fall prev to a lack of sound forethought.

This proposal will do little to further the longterm economy of Lake Cowichan as a potentially rich draw for global tourism.

We urge you to reconsider your proposal.

This plan that would include logging between Lakeview Park and the Cowichan Lake Education Centre (CLEC), raises serious concerns. The CLRSS encourages planning and initiatives that have no net negative impact on the Cowichan watershed. If the Forest Stewardship Plan to log this site moves forward, it will have a serious negative impact on the ecological services of the upland and riparian area of Lakeview. The Cowichan Lake and River Stewardship Society cannot support a plan that would see logging in this area.

The site is a forest/wetland that contains at least one pond and twenty-two seepage streams that flow down the generally steep slopes through the riparian area on the south shore of Cowichan Lake. The natural filtration that occurs as these streams pass through the upland forest and into the riparian area helps to mitigate water turbidity in the lake, not far from the Lake Cowichan water intake. Water turbidity is becoming a problem for residential water systems. Lake Cowichan is under a "Boil Water Advisory" again today. Natural filtration should be encouraged and protected so that water supplies can be safe without the installation of expensive mechanical filtration systems.

Ted Burns, local fisheries biologist, calls this area "Crying Hill", and in his April 24, 2004, "Environmental Assessment of a proposed trail from Lakeview Park to the Cowichan Lake Education Centre", he said that foot traffic could cause the streams to carry increased sediment to Cowichan Lake. He recommended that the streams be crossed with small bridges. Logging would cause far greater turbidity.

Tree removal in this area would destroy wildlife habitat in the upland and along the shore (tree frogs, red-legged frogs, river otters, mergansers, mallards, Canada geese, deer, bears, cougars, mink, and more) and would cause irreparable damage to shoreline fish habitat (salmonid, trout and, very possibly, Cowichan lamprey).

The CLRSS has just completed the initial three-year phase of its Cowichan Shoreline Stewardship Project. The society applies for grants, employs students, and uses volunteer labour to complete restoration of shoreline that has been impacted by poor property development practices. In three years, the project has restored about the same number of linear meters of riparian shoreline as would be negatively impacted by this "Forest Stewardship Plan" at the Lakeview site.

CLRSS educates, models, and communicates environmental stewardship. The society is directly involved in the development of the Lake Studies Program for all grades in Lake Cowichan School. The Lakeview site is a natural classroom for groups to learn stewardship. Because its proximity to community schools, the area has become demonstration site for nature studies and nature walks.

Lakeview forest is one of a very few Cowichan Lake forested areas left that includes sixty to eighty-yearold second growth trees and extends to the shore of the lake. It is the only one on the south arm of Cowichan Lake. For international and other groups attending the CLEC, it is this natural beauty of Lakeview that attracts them and brings them back year after year to study or simply enjoy the pristine surroundings.

The Lakeview site not only needs to be protected for its incredible natural value, but also as an attraction for tourists and new residents. It is what the growing number of visiting boaters see when they leave the Lake Cowichan boat launches and head up the lake. They only need to look above this oasis of forest to see the clear-cut blocks that surround it and that are prominent around most of the lake.

The Cowichan Lake and River Stewardship Society is dedicated to the protection and health of the Cowichan Watershed. The Forest Stewardship Plan would negatively impact the ecological services of the forest upland site, the seepage streams and ponds, the sloping riparian area and shoreline, and the lake. It would affect the health of the whole watershed. The CLRSS opposes the plan to log on the Lakeview site.

Dear Sir.

I write to you as a contractor of nature interpretation services at Cowichan Lake Education Centre. For the past twenty years or so I have been providing nature walks, nature games and other related activities at the Cowichan Lake Education Centre. I have provided these to hundreds of Cowichan Lake Secondary students, several hundred third year international UVIC students attending business school, natural history camps, various conferences and members of faith groups. Every time without fail, everyone comments on the beauty of taking the road down from Highway 18 and driving down through the woods to CLEC. At CLEC, even local students, some who have sadly seldom been in a forest, are mesmerized by one trail in particular. This trail starts out under a spectacular Bigleaf Maple, takes you over a bridge by a Salmon berry and Devils club forest. At this spot, you can see in the distance the lake with the rushing of a small creek below your feet. Both of these plants have been important to Coast Salish people for time immemorial providing an opportunity to celebrate this amazing culture. Then you come up through a forest full of old stumps with the markings of spring boards, from pre-chain saw days, providing a wonderful opportunity to talk about the importance of logging. Further in we come to several small wetlands providing viewing spots to watch woodpeckers, hummingbirds, and numerous plants. I particularly get asked to provide walks and talk on ethnobotany, traditional First Nations uses of plants. I am fortunate to have learnt from Elders and studied at UVIC under world renowned ethnobotanist Nancy Turner and enjoy sharing my knowledge, generally ending my walks with snacks of nettle tea, nettle pesto, Oregon grape jam and other goodies. On my walks we have many different experiences. The most spectacular was when with 15 adult UVIC students from all over the world, at a distance, we met a bear. I know this has created memories that these students will never forget. Another experience I have is having children and adults, ranging from 6 to in their 80s sitting in a quiet spot and engaging in activities such as listening deeply and writing a poem. Always people talk about how special it is to take quiet time and just "be" in nature. More and more research is showing that this sort of activity improves mental well being.

I also lead walks along the shoreline, where often I find evidence of raccoons or otters eating Western floater, the only known species of freshwater mussels found on Vancouver Island. Freshwater mussels are in decline around the world and we are fortunate to have a healthy population by CLEC. Lake Cowichan is the home of Vancouver lamphrey, which is a SARA species, Species at Risk, noted by the federal government. Studies have not been done to determine if this is along in the area to be logged. They spawn near creeks coming into lakes, the area to be logged has over 20 small creeks. Even though the shoreline will be protected the erosion and siltation will if lamphery are here, affect them and most definitely affect the salmon.

I have been informed that likely the aesthetics of my nature walks will not be affected since the logging will not happen in the sight line. However, the logging will deeply impact the diversity present on CLEC property. Also, the views from the road will be impacted. As a biologist, I am concerned about the increased sedimentation from erosion.

Although I am a nature educator I am not anti-logging, my father worked in the lumber industry and I use the products every day. I have taken a keen interest for many years in eco-forestry and was friends with Merv Wilkinson of Wildwood Forest. I was very involved in the recent successful efforts to save Wildwood which will now be owned and managed by Ecoforestry Institute, this is an internationally known model of sustainable forestry that people visit from all over the world. I hope that consideration will be given to consider this kind of forestry or help will be provided in finding another location for the Lake Cowichan First Nation to find their much needed wood elsewhere. This area is too important ecologically and for tourism potential to be logged, unless in a very sensitive innovative way.

Groups staying at CLEC are served by local staff, looking after visitor's delicious meals and rooms. This provides revenue to the town. I also shop in Lake Cowichan coming and going to my work at CLEC. The biggest reason that CLEC is of appeal is because it is in a beautiful natural setting.

I actively promote CLEC to groups I belong to as a great place to hold an event in a beautiful surrounding. I hope that this will continue to be the case. In closing I just want to comment on the fact that at some point this area was deemed ecologically important enough to be a provincial park. As BC Parks Volunteer of the Year in 2015 I take a great interest in Parks, it seems like it would behoove us all to keep this area protected for future generations, either as a model sustainable forest or protected in full.

Hi, Mark. Please find attached a letter expressing BCCF's concerns about proposed logging near the Cowichan Outdoor Education & Conference Centre. Peter Law and I are currently providing technical support/guidance to the Cowichan Lake and River Stewardship Society during implementation of the multi-year *Cowichan Shoreline Stewardship Project* (CSSP). CSSP was a vision of the late CLRSS founding president, Gerald Thom, who was rightfully alarmed about the rapid pace of shoreline development and environmental impacts around the lake over the last decade.

For the record, we strongly support the Lake Cowichan First Nation's rights and aspirations for economic independence and prosperity for its members. However, in this specific instance we are concerned that conventional logging in the proposed area may have unintended consequences for local forest hydrology, and

downstream effects on the shoreline and riparian habitats of Cowichan Lake. I'm sure you are well acquainted with the phenomenon of more frequent and intense droughts on southern Vancouver Island over the last 15 years. Consequently, this hydrologically 'rich' hillslope may be a natural oasis of biodiversity that is currently unmatched at the eastern end of Cowichan Lake.

In the longer term, we understand there may be plans for developing residential sub-divisions in the area in question. This could be even more significant in terms of impacts on local hydrology and change to the network of ephemeral streams and seasonal or permanent wetlands/pond(s). From a biodiversity perspective, this could further reduce the lake basin's natural capital which is already being eroded by the spread of urban development into previously zoned forestry lands. We also note the Town of Lake Cowichan currently subscribes to the principle of following a "water balance model" in all developments, under its existing OCP Bylaw No. 910-2011.

In summary, we strongly urge you to adopt a <u>risk-averse</u> approach to timber harvest in this special, high-profile area. We believe the area's habitat values, biodiversity and direct linkage to Cowichan Lake warrant the highest level of protection in any future harvesting prescriptions. We look forward to reviewing your finalized Forest Stewardship Plan after the formal Public Review and Comment period.

Re: Proposed Logging near Cowichan Lake Outdoor Education & Conference Centre

We are writing to express our concerns about proposed logging of an advanced second growth stand on public forest land near the Cowichan Lake Outdoor Education & Conference Centre. It is our understanding that Teal Jones is acting as the forest stewardship planning agent on behalf of the Lake Cowichan First Nation, who hold harvesting rights to FTOA Licence A94261, within Lots 10 and 14 of the subject area. Logging appears to be the first phase of a comprehensive residential land development proposed for the property (Figure 1.). Our comments reflect on the short term logging impacts, as well as the long term impacts that traditional residential housing will have on the hydrology of the area, and how it is important to dovetail your logging plans with how future land development must function to preserve a landscape level "water balance".

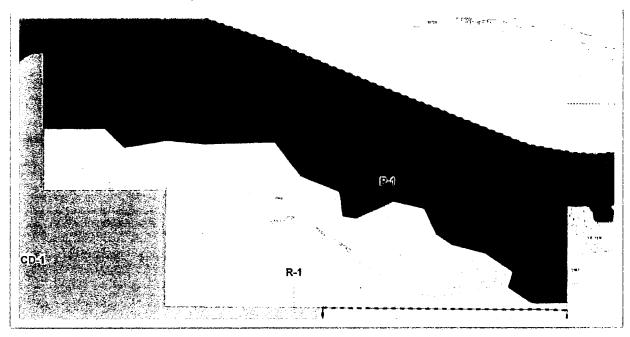


Figure 2. Aquatic Plants adjacent to subject property

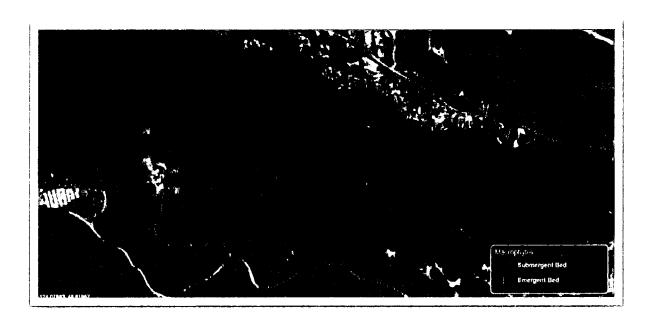


Figure 3. Amphibian Suitability adjacent subject property

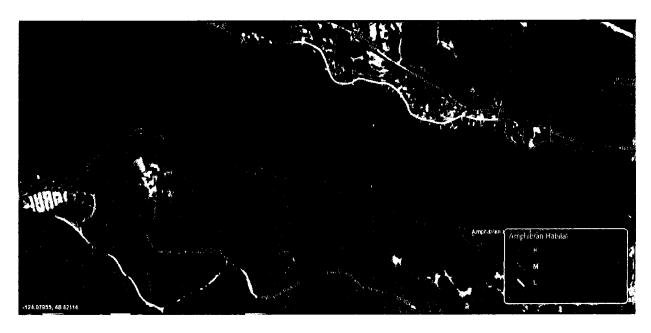
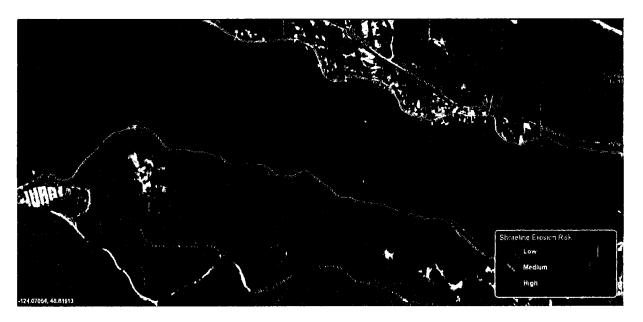


Figure 4. Shoreline Erosion Risk adjacent to subject property

For your information, we are senior biologists with the BC Conservation Foundation in Lantzville, a key partner of the Cowichan Lake & River Stewardship Society (CLRSS) in delivering the Cowichan Shoreline Stewardship Project (CSSP), a multi-year conservation initiative designed to restore natural shoreline Vegetation and promote enhanced shoreline stewardship practices in the Cowichan Valley. In the first two years of our assessments of the shoreline of Cowichan Lake, we studied a number of subject areas that provide background on important biological and physical functions the lake shoreline provides. We have attached some maps of the subject property, with links to some of the reports, for your consideration (Figures 2, 3, 4, 5).

We have recently learned the subject area has extraordinary environmental sensitivity given the myriad of ephemeral streams, wetlands and pond that drain the upland forest north into Cowichan Lake. There may also be unusual groundwater stratigraphy along the hillslope, with the possibility of an extensive,

shallow clay seam contributing to the proliferation of seeps and small channels conveying seasonal runoff towards the lake (Ted Burns, RPBio., pers. comm.).

A preponderance of wet soil conditions could complicate logging plans, particularly given the nearby proximity of popular recreational beaches (Lakeview Park & Campsites), and valuable fish habitats along the lake shoreline, downslope of proposed harvesting blocks (i.e., about 1.5 km of shoreline separates the Education Centre from Lakeview Beach).

This east end of this same lakeshore segment is now under active consideration by BCCF/CLRSS as a candidate for riparian restoration in 2017, and beyond. Consequently, we are concerned that significant sediment transport and deposition into the lake from upslope harvesting could affect the future success of restoration, and even the established recreational use of Lakeview Beach. This concern is partly based on sediment transport response to the lake's predominant westerly winds, which would potentially bring fine sediment into newly planted shoreline and recreational beach areas.

While we have not yet conducted a thorough field inspection of the proposed logging area, we would like to know what steps Teal Jones has taken recently to document biodiversity values in proposed cut blocks, including presence of provincially-listed species of conservation concern.

The original 1999 report by Thurber Engineering Ltd. entitled, "Ecological Habitat Review — Lakeview Development, Lake Cowichan, BC" is a reasonable baseline, but surely needs to be updated to reflect the passage of 18 years. That said, the Thurber report did highlight a number of concerns about the potential presence of provincially listed species in this area, where detailed biological inventories were generally lacking at the time.

Finally, we would like to bring to your attention to an item in Chapter 15 of the Town of Lake Cowichan's Official Community Plan (OCP Bylaw No. 910-2011). Within the Bylaw the following statement is made:

"Currently, the Town is working to decrease the inflow and infiltration of storm water runoff. Integrated storm water management techniques that incorporate a <u>water balance model</u> are applied to all new development."

As Ted Burns previously reported, there are many small streams that transect the logging area, flowing down to the lake. From his observations, we can speculate there is a very active flow of water (or interflow) within the top 600 mm of soils across the entire surface of Lot 10 and Lot 14. Trees and forest cover have a significant influence on the interflow, especially at this site. We suggest that any logging plan incorporate a clear understanding of how the loss of forest cover will influence the site's surficial hydrology such that future land development will be able to adhere to the goal of managing "storm water," as stated (above) in the OCP.
